<p>Student Scenario #1: Maria</p> <p>Sex Assigned at Birth</p> <p>Gender Identity</p> <p>Gender Stereotypes</p>	<p>Maria's friends could say... How exciting that your aunts are having a baby! The baby will be your cousin! The ultrasound must have shown that the baby has a vulva, so their sex assigned at birth will be girl. Since gender is how your new cousin will feel inside, you will have to wait to find out their true gender. Gender stereotypes are already at work as shown by the pink frosting and plans to buy pink baby clothes. Congratulations on your new cousin!</p>
<p>Student Scenario #2: James and Derek</p> <p>Gender Expression</p> <p>Gender Stereotypes</p>	<p>Derek could say... Stop teasing James. James can wear anything he likes. People can express their gender any way they want to, and it doesn't mean they are gay or not. Just because you have gender stereotypes, that doesn't mean you can pick on people.</p>

Her gender expression doesn't fit your expectations and gender stereotypes, but that is not your problem. I want you to respect Hannah, just like you do me and the other soccer players. Now, let's play ball!

Malik's dad could say... Good question, Malik. We don't know that person's gender, do we? We would need to ask them what their gender identity is if we wanted to know, but it doesn't really make a difference, does it? If they were a friend or family member, we would probably ask so we could treat them respectfully. That person's gender expression had some things that matched gender stereotypes for boys and some that matched stereotypes for girls, right? That person might be gender non-binary or feels like they are a combination of genders.
